Introduction

WebViews Editor is a graphic editing mode you can access directly in the Foreseer web interface. Using the WebViews Editor, you can modify and build the WebViews pages that make up a Foreseer user interface. WebViews pages typically fall into one of three categories:

- Location diagrams, which can be maps, floor plans, etc. These are two-dimensional, top- view diagrams used to direct users to the right geographic location. They are typically at the top levels of the Foreseer WebViews hierarchy. These are generally just a background image with links added in the appropriate places.
- Electrical one-line diagrams. These not only show the electrical connections, but also real-time data from the various devices depicted on the one-line. In most cases, these will make up the bulk of the WebViews pages in the Foreseer system. These consist of lines and devices as well as channel values from those devices.
- Elevation diagrams. Typically, these are front views of equipment cabinets with realtime data from the various devices displayed in the appropriate locations on the cabinet. They're built like location diagrams using a background image.

The WebViews Editor is a separately licensed product. If you don't have a license for the WebViews Editor, contact your Eaton sales person or application manager. There are a few things you'll need to do before you can start building your WebViews pages:

- Have an installed and configured instance of Foreseer available.
- Make certain your login credentials are part of a Foreseer user group with sufficient privileges to use the WebViews Editor. This is described in the *Foreseer Server Guide*.
- Install the appropriate devices in Foreseer via either the Device Config utility or the Foreseer server. Once installed, devices and their channels are available on pages throughout Foreseer.
- Create the folder hierarchy (using the WebConfig utility) you'll need to support your various WebViews pages. Each WebViews page must have its own folder in the hierarchy.
 - The WebViews Editor is intended for use on a PC only, and requires both a keyboard and pointing device. You cannot use WebViews Editor on a tablet or Chromebook.

Introducing WebViews Editor Guide

WebViews pages are graphical representations of a Foreseer site used to monitor multiple

locations and conditions. A WebViews page can be:

- Map or floor plan based diagrams showing the location of sites, buildings, and equipment.
- One-line electrical diagrams that provide real-time views of critical energy data from your equipment.
- Location diagrams, showing the physical location of equipment in electrical panels as well as real-time data from that equipment.
- Detailed dashboard views of the most popular real-time data from each piece of equipment.

WebViews Editor is used to construct and configure WebViews pages. The editor works within your browser, and provides tools to:

- Place and configure objects that represent devices or channels and provide real-time channel data.
- Draw lines to connect devices in a one-line diagram.
- Place and configure graph and waveform objects, to provide detailed views of channel data or events.
- Add text boxes.
- Add graphics to WebViews pages or define a graphic for use as a background image on a page.
- Create hyper-links to navigate to other WebViews pages.
- Apply display styles to set the look-and-feel of elements on a WebViews page.
- Connect lines and control objects to device channels.
- Add HTML iFrame objects to display information from other web assets, such as video feeds or external web pages.

Accessing WebViews Editor Guide

Access to WebViews Editor Guide is controlled by Foreseer's account privileges. At a minimum, anyone accessing WebViews Editor Guide requires the PXSauthADMIN permissions. Also, editing web pages requires the right to view the pages. There are a number of permissions that carry the right to view all WebViews pages. See the Foreseer Administrator's Guide for more details about account privileges.


Guide to the WebViews Interface

Editing Interface

The WebViews Editor editing interface is designed to have your WebViews page designed on the left side of the screen and the controls available for creating your page on the right. Use Add or the sidebar to add objects to the page. When you are satisfied with your changes, click Save.




WebViews Editing Interface: saving and adding.

You can use the sidebar tabs to select which controls are displayed




Object Placement

To place an object, double click on the object to place it on the page.




Object Properties

To display all of the object / control's properties, select the object you are interested in and the properties for that object will be displayed in the right panel.




Channel Picker

Use the Edit Link channel picker to link to a channel.




Controlling Links

You can link channels and view what is linked, as well as control the background image from the Object Menu



Layer Menu

Use the layers menu to control z-axis layers.



Language Selection Dropdown

Foreseer has the ability to select from multiple languages if the supporting language packs have been installed. To access the available languages on your Foreseer system, click on the down-arrow to display a list of available languages to you.



Once you select the language of your choice, Foreseer will display all of the interface in that chosen language.

Designing Pages

Creating WebViews pages in the WebViews Editor is similar to using a drawing or illustration program, with a few critical differences:

- In some respects, what you can do is limited because you are interacting with a web browser while creating the page. For example, while you can draw single segment or multi-segment lines, these lines are constrained to right angles. However, the advantage to using the browser is that you don't need to install a special application on the client or server computer to create the WebViews pages, instead all you need is a browser.
- 2. Many of the drawing objects can be connected back to live data from the various devices on your network. These drawing objects can help users visualize what's going on in your electrical system by displaying values received from devices as a color, action, or by directly displaying a value. For example:
 - o A line in a one-line diagram can change color to represent the current value of a monitored attribute.
 - o An animation of a relay symbol will open and close when data is received indicating that the relay itself has opened or closed.
 - o An analog gauge will indicate the current or voltage value from a monitored attribute. A Channel object will change color to indicate that a critical or cautionary alarm exists.

3. You can also place navigational objects to link to other WebViews pages, which can provide links to other locations in the tree or give the user a "breadcrumb" trail for navigating back through the WebViews pages.

Getting Started

A good approach to creating your WebViews pages is to begin by drafting them with pencil and paper. Consider which pages should be "children" of other pages and how pages should be linked. Such a diagram will tell you how to construct the folder structure to support your web design.

For individual pages, sketch out the areas for object placement including text descriptions to identify the various objects that will occupy each space. Once you have created the basic layout for a page, determine which objects should be grouped for easy editing (see Layer Groups and Z-Index Settings). You may want to group image objects together or place all the user interface objects in one Layer Group. Remember that you need not get the layout perfect for

each page; changes inevitably will be made as the project progresses.

Because the WebViews Editor isn't a true drawing program, you can't use it to generate complicated graphic art. You're also restricted by browser display limitations. Therefore, objects created within the WebViews Editor are confined to straight lines and squares drawn along the X- and Y-axes. Curves, diagonals, or rounded corners can only be introduced into the page design by first creating such images in a dedicated graphics program and then uploading those graphics.

Also, before starting to lay out your pages, determine what devices and Channels should be added to Foreseer to ensure that you have the correct data inputs available. Having these available for use will make the task of building the pages just that much easier. Keep in mind that you can reference Channels from child WebViews in the parent. Finally, there is an automatic resizing function that occurs when you switch from editing a WebViews page. This can cause objects on the edges of very large pages to not display in Monitor view. To test this, simply examine your WebViews page after you save and exit from edit mode.

Performance may degrade if you place a very large number of objects on a page, especially if the objects actively display data.

Templates

If you intend to create templates for use in WebViews, you should plan for future expansion by anticipating the greatest number of channels and objects that could be placed on any given page. Extraneous channels and objects can always be deleted from pages that are created using a WebViews template. By initially defining the maximum number of potential objects, you can accommodate potential changes and alter page design as necessary rather than revising the template later. It is important to remember that you will have to update every derivative page at the Web Server if you change a template. Thus, while the investment in initial design is somewhat greater, the result is easier creation of any future pages based on your template.

Default Layout File


A default web page is created whenever a new folder is added to the WebViews hierarchy. The index.htm file that is created normally loads the style sheets, script files and default HTML elements for the page. The page also receives a layout file (layout.xml) that defines the initial objects on the page. This is based on the DefaultLayout.xml file located in the WWW/Support folder. The default layout consists of a page header containing a Date and Time object, a Breadcrumbs object, and an Alarm Count object.

To override the default layout, you can create a new file (named user_DefaultLayout.xml) by editing any WebViews page until you are satisfied with the positioning of objects. Simply duplicate and rename the copy of the layout.xml file in that page's folder, then copy it to the WWW/Support folder.

The index.htm file is created from page begin and page end template files (PageBegin.tmpl and PageEnd.tmpl), also located in the WWW/Support folder. These template files similarly can be overridden by introducing new files named user_PageBegin.tmpl and user_PageEnd.tmpl to the WWW/Support folder.

Layer Groups and Z-Index Settings

Layer (groups) 1 through 8 allow you to hide all objects that exist in a set of layers, temporarily removing them from editing. To make things easy, layer groups span all layers in a decade (twenties, thirties, etc.). So, if you turn off "show" for objects in Layer (group) 2, any objects with a Z-index layer of 20 through 29 would be hidden. When you save and click Done, all hidden layer groups are shown in WebViews. You can hide and show Layer (groups) through the Show command on the Layers menu.




The Z-Index function determines visibility for overlapping objects. The WebViews Editor supports 79 separate "drawing layers" (10 through 89) called Z-Indexes. All objects, by default, are initially created with a normal Z-Index of "50."

The normal setting should not normally be adjusted as in most cases design elements do not overlap. You should only have to map out the layering order of the affected objects in more complicated layouts. If the page layout requires objects to overlap, keep in mind that the higher the Z-Index, the "closer" the object appears to be (in the stack) to the viewer.

For example, assume two Text objects overlap. Text A has a Z-Index of "40" and Text B has a Z-Index of "50." The Text B object will be visible above Text A in the shared area. If two objects with the same Z-Index overlap, the most recently created object is visible in the shared area. When the creation order is an issue, use the Z-Index commands to change the layering. You can either increment the Z-Index of the object you want in front (Alt+Plus), or decrement the Z-Index of the object you want in back (Alt+Minus). It's also important to determine the layers on which your page objects will reside. Because you may be adding many elements to a page (including some that potentially overlap), you'll want to establish an easy method to select these objects for editing. Layer groups allow you to turn editing capabilities on and off for all objects that exist in a defined layer.

An editing layer group limits which objects are eligible for selection based on their Z-Index value. When a layer group is active, all selection and editing commands affect only those objects within that group. The Ctrl+A command, for example, will only select objects with Z-Index values that fall within that particular layer group. The WebViews Editor has eight predefined layer groups, each group consisting of ten Z-Index layers.

The following figure shows an example of the layout groups, each with their own objects. In this example, objects were placed on layers 1, 2, and 8.



Layout groups in use. Note how the background image is always below the other groups.

The following defines the ranges of Z-Index settings for objects within each layer group:

| Layer | Z-Index |
|---------|-----------------|
| Layer 1 | Z-Index "10-19" |
| Layer 2 | Z-Index "20-29" |
| Layer 3 | Z-Index "30-39" |
| Layer 4 | Z-Index "40-49" |
| Layer 5 | Z-Index "50-59" |
| Layer 6 | Z-Index "60-69" |
| Layer 7 | Z-Index "70-79" |
| Layer 8 | Z-Index "80-89" |

To take full advantage of this feature, you should first decide the layer levels to which your objects will belong. As noted, layering is based on each object's Z-Index value, or relative position. The higher the Z-Index number, the "closer" the object is to the viewer; the lower the ZIndex, the further it is from the viewer. Therefore, the Z-Index determines which object is visible when two or more objects overlap. For objects with the same Z-Index, the order in which they were created determines visibility, with the newest object being visible in the overlapping area.

Applying layer groups to similar objects minimizes editing and revision time. The ten Z-Index levels within each of the eight layer groups allow you to move objects forward and backward within that group. This can be extremely useful when you're creating complex interfaces with numerous overlapping objects. For example, you can place one object on Z-Index "10" and another on Z-Index "19" to distance them visually, yet you can change both objects when you're editing Layer 1.

Although objects may be positioned inside a layer group, because they overlap they may still be difficult to edit. If you find this to be the case, isolate objects that are difficult to select on separate layer groups once the layout is complete.

To make the best use of layer groups, turn the layer editing function on as you bring elements into the page. For example, suppose you want the static images segregated for easy selection. You might place those objects while you're editing Layer 4 (Alt+4). This places the objects in the current Z-Index group at Layer "45" and allows you to edit them separately from other content.

Using Editing Layers

Keep the following in mind when working with editing layers:

- 1. A selected object's layer can be changed by double-clicking it and then typing the appropriate level in the Z-Index field.
- 2. When you create objects, ensure they are created within the appropriate level by first using the Alt+1–8 keys to switch to that level.
- 3. If you choose to import or create an object in a specific layer group, that object is placed in the middle layer of the group. For example, if you choose Layer 1 to be the active layer, the object you import into the group will be placed on Z-Index "15," Layer 2 on Z-Index "25," and so on.

The following list identifies where new objects are placed in the Z-Index hierarchy if you place the object without first setting the editing layer (or if you press Alt+0). If you haven't set the editing then most objects are placed at the same level and you must manually change the ZIndex setting.

| Object | Layer |
|----------------|------------|
| Channels | Layer "50" |
| Folder | Layer "50" |
| Line Object | Layer "50" |
| Animated Image | Layer "50" |
| Static Image | Layer "50" |
| Text Object | Layer "50" |
| Flash Object | Layer "89" |
| Hyperlink | Layer "89" |
| Control Object | Layer "89" |

Once an object is placed, you can easily move it to a different layer. The Z-Index Front and Z-Index Back commands move the selected object(s) to the front or back of the active layer; the Z-Index Increment (Alt+Plus) and Z-Index Decrement (Alt+Minus) commands

move the object(s) one layer at a time in each direction. These settings are found in the object's properties.

Flash and Control Objects

Flash and Control objects are exceptions to the Z-Index level hierarchy. These two object types are always in front of other types of objects regardless of the level to which they are assigned. Thus, you will not be able to place other design objects at a higher level than these two object types. However, you can place like objects (other Control or Flash objects) on top of each other using the Z-Index commands.

Working With Images

As mentioned earlier, the WebViews Editor can only create lines and rectangles. All other images must be in the form of graphics files that you either pull from the built-in library or create in a third-party graphics application and upload to the Foreseer server. You'll also need to use graphics files if you wish to provide backgrounds for WebViews pages.

Image Objects in the WebViews Editor

The WebViews Editor supports the following types of image objects:

| Object | Description |
|------------------|--|
| Background Image | These provide a background to the WebViews page, one per page. A background image can't be scaled, so when you create them be mindful of the target size of the page. they will however be resized according to the "Resize to Fit" function of WebViews. |
| Static Images | These are simply graphics, and can be positioned and sized as you wish on a page. You can use these to represent electrical equipment or whatever you like. For example, if you are showing two buildings on a single web page then you could load both floor plans as images. While these are called static images, you can provide animation by using animated .gif files. |
| Animated Images | These aren't truly animations, but rather |

| | are sets of three images used to represent zero, non-zero, or no data values from a Channel. Thus, one designated image from the set will display when the value is zero, another will display when the value is non-zero, and a third will display when no data is available from the Channel. |
|---------------------|---|
| Value Mapped Images | These are sets of up to 10 images, and each image can be mapped to multiple numeric or text values from the Channel. |
| Flash Images | These are true animations, and continue to loop as long as the page is displayed. |

Background images, static images, animated images, and value-mapped images are all bit-mapped graphics, and can be JPEG (.jpg), GIF or animated GIF (.gif), or PNG (.png) format.

There are some design considerations to keep in mind when creating graphics:

- Create graphics at exactly the size you'd like them to display. While you can resize the graphics in the WebViews Editor the clarity of the graphic is limited by the number of pixels and the resolution. Thus, if you have an icon for electrical equipment that's only 24 pixels x 24 pixels, it will look "blocky" if its size is greatly increased. Also, if the size of a graphic will be reasonably small on WebViews pages, don't create a high-resolution file with lots of pixels. This simply wastes storage space on the server and needlessly uses bandwidth when loading a page in the client browser.
- Consider the resolution of the client display when constructing background images. Background images will not automatically stretch and cannot be resized. Therefore, set your display to the same resolution as the client machine(s) when you build your background graphics so that you can judge how large they should be.

Graphics Directory in Foreseer

If you're loading a large set of graphics and you have access to the Foreseer, you can copy the graphics files into the appropriate folders. The default folder for images is in Windows is:

<Install Drive>:\Eaton Corporation\Foreseer\WWW\Support\images

The folder is populated with sub folders which contain images in the different formats. It is important that image files be placed in the proper folder:


| Folder | Description |
|---------------|---|
| anime folder | Contains "animation" files (either Animated Images or Value-Mapped Images). |
| page folder | Contains default map and panel images used for user view page backgrounds. |
| static folder | Contains web page image files. Use Ctrl+I to view these files. |

If you do directly copy files to these directories, keep in mind that the image manager will only delete files that have the read-only Channel cleared. Conversely, if you want to prevent users from deleting files, set the read-only attribute.

Creating and Editing Styles


Styles modify the appearance of Channels, Lines, Text Boxes, Hyperlinks, and Folders. You can either create new styles or edit existing styles that were created by you or another user. You can't edit the built- in set of styles.

- Creating a New Style




Creating a New Style


For new or user-created styles, you can change the text size, weight, font family, color, and orientation. You can also change the color and border appearance of objects. To edit or create a style, select an object and click Create/Edit.




When creating a new style, you'll need to give it a name. You can't use spaces or special characters in the style name. If you do, you won't be able to click Next until you remove them. After specifying a name, select a style from the dropdown list to use as a model. This preloads the new style with the settings from the style you select in the list. The appearance of the selected style is shown in the Preview. Click next to modify the appearance.



You can change the border and background transparency on the gear tab. Background color can also be set for all objects except Channel and Folder. You can see the results of your changes in the Preview. If you want to set a specific color for the border, instead of selecting a color using the picker you can enter the hexadecimal code for the color directly. When you move to another field or press tab the new color will show in the preview. Note that background color cannot be set for either Folders or Channels.



Use the Type tab to change the appearance of the label text. You can set the font family, size, color, weight, and orientation. The list of available fonts is the set of fonts currently installed on the Foreseer server.



When you've finished making changes, click Save to add your new style to the list.

Editing a User Created Style

To edit an existing user-created style, simply select Edit Existing Style and then select it from the Style list. You can now change all of the attributes of that style just as you did when it was created.

Aligning Objects and Lines

This chapter covers methods to use to align objects and lines as well as describing the use of Layers in WebViews Editor.



Selecting Multiple Objects

When editing, click-and-drag a selection box to completely enclose the objects that you wish to select. Partially enclosed objects won't be selected.

Selection Box (Rubber Band Control)

You can also select multiple items by Ctrl-clicking each one (use Cmd-click on a Mac).




Selection Box

The Importance of Focus

Objects and Lines align around the object with focus. You can tell an object has focus because it has a red outline and sizing handles (as opposed to a blue outline which shows a selected object). In the following figure, the center line has focus.


A focused object is taken as reference for the positioning while aligning the objects using alignment controls, like top, bottom, right, left, and middle

Selected Objects

Other selected objects align around focus. The following example shows how this works with Vertical Align Top. This is a handy behavior because you can select which object to align to instead of everything aligning to the object that is furthest in the direction of alignment.




For example, Vertical Align Top always aligns with the top of the item that has focus.

Using Layers to Overlap Objects

The Z-Index function determines the stacking order for overlapping objects. The WebViews Editor supports 79 separate "drawing layers" (10 through 89) called Z-Indexes. Most objects, by default, are initially created on Z-index layer 50. However, some objects have a different default layer; for example, control objects are on z-index 89 and iFrame objects are on z-index 51.

In most cases design elements do not overlap, so you don't need to change the layer for the object. If the page layout requires objects to overlap, keep in mind that higher the Z-Index numbers are closer to the "top" of the stack and will appear over objects on lower layers.

You can use either the toolbar or sidebar to change the z-index level.



Three stacked objects on different z-index levels.

② If two objects with the same Z-Index overlap, the most recently created object is on top (even though both objects are still on layer 50). When creation order is an issue, use the Z-Index commands to change the layering.

Working With Channel Objects

One of the most useful WebViews Editor design objects is a Channel object. You must first create all of the Channels necessary for your Channel objects. In brief, a Channel object can display values from any device that's been added to the current WebViews page or any of its child pages. Once Channel objects have been added to the layout, you can move them around the page and style them as desired.

Channel Objects

A Channel object can display values from a single channel for any device added to Foreseer. These objects, especially Channel, are used throughout WebViews pages to provide operators with real-time updates to Channels. Channels are often shown:

- By themselves, usually on electrical one-lines or floor plans.
- Grouped together in "boxes" (which are merely static images) to show the most important Channels from a device. These are usually shown on an electrical one-line.
- Superimposed over elevation diagram panel static images to show Channel values from an object in that position.



A channel object in a data display box (edit mode)

A Channel object can display values from a single channel for any device added to Foreseer. You can place a Channel object through either the shortcut key "C" or by using the Channels and Folders tab on the sidebar. You can continue to press "C" to cycle forward or Short+C to cycle backward through the various channels already in use on the page. You can press "F9" to add a set of channel objects corresponding to all channels currently in use on the page.

You can pre-load a set of channels onto a page through the WebConfig Utility.


Adding a Device Channel to an Object

You can link any object to a device or derived channel through either:

- Channel Link in the side bar
- The Link to Channel command in the Objects menu.

Click the Change Link to launch the Link to Channel dialog box. Along the right, you'll find a tree listing servers, devices, and channels. You can expand the list under servers (in this case, just the local Foreseer server) to show all of its devices, system channels, and derived channels. Click one of these to select it.

 WebViews Channels, are only those channels already in use or channels added through the WebViews Editor.



Channel State Color Codes

The Alarms/Events Log provides a view of Channel alarms or events. You may however wish to provide an at-a-glance view of the status of devices.

Device or Channel status is indicated by color:

| | Color | Alarm State |
|---|------------|--|
| | Red | Critical alarm state |
| | Yellow | Cautionary alarm state |
| | Blue | Acknowledged alarm state |
| - | Gray | Inactive alarm or event state. This is the default color for Channel objects in edit mode. |

The device status that bubbles up is the highest priority status of the various devices. The following lists the priorities of device status:

- 1. Critical alarm, which always bubbles up.
- 2. Cautionary alarm, which bubbles up if there are no devices with a higher priority status.
- 3. Critical acknowledged alarm, which bubbles up if there are no devices with higher priority status.
- 4. Cautionary acknowledged alarm, which bubbles up if there are no devices with higher priority status.
- 5. No data, which bubbles up if there are no devices with higher priority status.
- 6. Disabled, which only affects the containing nodes. Both devices and channels can be disabled. Disabled will only bubble up to the direct parent node. It will not bubble up beyond the direct parent device.
- 7. Disarmed, which has the lowest priority, and only affects the direct parent device containing the disarmed channels. It will not bubble up beyond the direct parent device.
- 8. Normal status.

Only channels can be disarmed in Foreseer.

Also, as a designer, keep in mind that the targets of a Folder link can be:

- Another WebViews page. In this instance the Folder Link serves both as a navigational tool (click it and the browser jumps to the target WebViews page) and as a visual indicator of the status of the target WebViews page. A WebViews page status is derived from the status of all of the devices in the Devices list for that page as well as the status of any sub-views.
- A device summary page. In this instance the Folder Link provides a visual indication of the status of the target device and a quick link to that device summary page for more information.
- An arbitrary node in the System tree. For instance, if the target of the Folder Link was the System node itself, the status reflected in the Folder Link would be the status that bubbled up from all nodes in the tree. If the target were the Foreseer node, the status would be derived from all devices attached to that node.

Status of Devices and Channels

Devices and channels in the network tree manage their own alarms and status and the status of their "children" are not involved in determining this. Their status is determined by the following sets of priorities:

- 1. Disabled has the highest priority.
- 2. Next is no data.


- 3. Next is disarmed. (If the device is disarmed, its alarm state is ignored.)
- 4. Next is unacknowledged critical alarm.
- 5. Next is unacknowledged cautionary alarm.
- 6. Next is acknowledged critical alarm.
- 7. Next is acknowledged cautionary alarm.
- 8. Last is normal.


Bubble-Up Examples

Common Design Tasks


There are some common tasks that are used throughout WebViews Editor. Those include:

Linking to a Channel

Click to select the design object that you wish to link to a Channel. You may select as many objects as you like to link to the Channel input.

Press Ctrl+Spacebar.



- 1. Click the appropriate Channel in the list that appears.
- 2. Click OK.

Adjusting Absolute Position

The Alignment controls set the top and left starting positions of the object (measured from the top left corner) and its width and height. All settings are in pixels. Z-index sets the stack order. For more about how z-index works in Foreseer, see<u>Layer Groups and Z-Index Settings</u>.

Finding Objects Without Links

To determine which objects are not properly linked to the appropriate Channels, press the "U" key (or select Show Unlinked from the Objects menu). Unlinked objects or objects not linked to an available Channel are highlighted.


Finding What Channels are Linked to Objects

To see which Channels are linked to objects, press the "K" key (or select Show Linked from the Objects menu). Linked objects or objects linked to a Channel are highlighted.


Linear Gauge Irregular Scenarios

The linear gauge shading is working as expected for the correct values. However, there are a few scenarios where the behavior may not be the expected behavior. Some of those cases are documented here to help identify where these issues may come up and help avoid any confusion.


1. The End 2 and End 3 values are smaller than End 1. End 2 is treated as the first point and rest of the end points are ignored.




2. End 1 has a value, End 2 is 0 and End 3 has another value. The End 3 shade color is given to the entire component.



3. The End 3 color is visible outside of the linear scale range. The Position Min is equal to 10 and the Position Max is equal to 50. Set section count to 3. End 1 color will be 10 to 20 and End 2 color will be 20 to 50.



4. The Color Shading exceeds the End limit. This scenario occurs when according to the internal scale calculations the End point comes out to be a decimal value. In the UI front, decimal End points are not supported in the Linear scale. So, it appears to be exceeding the End point limit, but in reality it is working as expected.



Sliding Scale Control

The Sliding Scale is a moving gauge with a linear representation of the data. A single static pointer indicates the position of the moving scale.


Waveform Control

Hyperlink Control

To edit the label and the URL, double click the hyperlink object to display the property editor. You may leave the label blank. Hyperlinks by default will open the page pointed to in the URL field in the same browser window. Optionally, you can have the link opened in

a new window by changing the "Open In" property. When using a separate window, you can specify the window size.

This object provides text or a button on a web page that can link to any other accessible web page. These pages can either open in a new browser window or replace the WebViews page and load the target into the current browser page. A Hyperlink object has no link until you set its parameters through the Properties dialog box.

You can set the following parameters:


The text for the hyperlink itself.

- The target URL.
- Whether the page should open in the same or a new browser window.
- If the page opens in a new browser window, the height and width of the window.
- The z-index of the Hyperlink object on the WebViews page.
- The style (visual format) of the Hyperlink object. By default, there are four available styles for Hyperlink objects; however, you can add your own.

To create a Hyperlink object:

- Press Ctrl+H or right-click on the page and select Hyperlink from the Objects menu.
 - You can do almost anything with a Hyperlink object that you can do with an <a href> element in an HTML page. For example, if you specify the mailto: protocol and provide an email address as part of that link, clicking the Hyperlink object will launch the default email program with an email preloaded with that address.



Line/Rectangle Control

Square/Rectangle objects can show the state of connected channels and can have Text objects placed over them (using the Z-order).

You can create a single line in Edit mode on the Text and Graphics tab. Double-click Line/Rectangle to place a line segment. You can stretch a line both vertically and horizontally to create longer or shorter lines or rectangles.

Once drawn, you can rotate a line 90° by changing the Line Orientation from Horizontal to Vertical. You can change the color and opacity from the sidebar. The color is used only if the line isn't linked to a channel. When linked to a channel, the line color reflects the color corresponding to the channel state.



Value Mapped Line Control

A Mapped Bus (line) object is similar to the Bus (Line), but can be set to indicate multiple values, by colors that you assign, from a selected Channel. The rules for Normal mappings are:

- Each object can have its own individual color mapping.
- You can add as many mappings per object as you like.
- A single color can have multiple associated values. For example, yellow might indicate a value of 4 or 5. However, this must be an exact match, and will not indicate a value between 4 and 5. You'll need to use Advanced mapping to map to a range of values.
- Mapped values can be integer numbers, floating point numbers, or text values

(strings).

- Text values are not case sensitive
- Each text value must be enclosed in single or double quotes.






Multiline Control


The Multiline Object provides a handy way to draw multiple line segments in which each new segment automatically starts at the end point of the previously drawn segment. Segments are constrained to 90° (right angles).

To draw a multi-segment line:

- 1. Select **Multi-Line** from the **Objects** menu or press the "m" key.
- 2. Click at the start point for the first line segment.
- 3. Click at the end point for the first line segment (the next line segment will use this as its start point).
- 4. Click at the end point for the next line segment. Remember that the line is constrained to right angles so the next segment may not end where you clicked.



5. Double-click to designate the last end point and stop line segment drawing.



When you double-click, all line segments are selected and the last segment drawn has focus. To reposition the entire group, drag the segment with focus (it has the handles). After you click away from the group of lines, you can select each segment individually or select the group by dragging a selection box.

iFrame Control

Frame objects provide the functionality of the HTML 4.0 IFrame element in WebViews pages. You can use IFrame objects to embed other web pages directly in a WebViews pages. For example, you can embed frames that show streaming video from web cams throughout your facility or that provide access to web-hosted forms or email systems within your intranet. Any custom HTML you create and serve via a web server can be referenced and embedded in a WebViews page with this object.

① Do not point an IFrame object to any Foreseer page. You should link IFrame objects only to external web pages.



Value Mapped Image Control

Value Mapped Images are similar to Animated Images, but the choice of which of the three images is displayed depends on rules that match a set of numeric values or strings. Value Mapped Lines have rules that specify the line color depending on the value of the linked channel. Like standard Lines, you can set the opacity and style for Value Mapped Lines.

The numeric values in the rules are exact matches; that is, you cannot specify greater than or less than. You can specify floating point numeric values. You can also specify text strings to match. Each string must be enclosed in double quotes. For example: "closed" or "open."


Value Mapped Images can only have up to 10 images in a set, and therefore 10 corresponding rules. Value Mapped Lines can have up to 10 rules and color variations.

✓ Value Mapped Images and Lines work well with derived channels. You can use
the derived channels arithmetic features to convert ranges of analog values into
the fixed values required.


Checkbox Control

Check Box objects are used in conjunction with Graphs. When you click the Graph link, it launches the Graphing window and graphs only the Channels from Channel objects with selected Check Box objects.

To create Check Boxes for Channel objects:

- 1. In edit mode, select all Channel objects that should have check boxes.
- 2. Press x. Linked Check Box objects are created to the right of each Channel object.


